### "What do you Lutherans Believe, Anyway?"

A few days ago someone asked me, "So what is it that you Lutherans believe?" I only had a couple of minutes, and I knew I would probably never see this person again. A question like this cuts out all the extras and invites an often needed clarity. How, dear friends, would you answer a question? What would you say if a stranger gave you five minutes to teach them what we believe, teach and confess?

I'll tell you what I said, "Lutherans see two teachings from God in the Scriptures: the Law and the Gospel." The law shows us what God requires, and because we do not and cannot keep the law, it ultimately shows us that we are sinners. The Gospel, on the other hand, shows us what God has done for us in Christ, especially in His suffering and death, to win for us the forgiveness of our sins.

This distinction between the Law and the Gospel stands at the heart of everything we believe, teach, preach, pray and do. Martin Luther' instructed his students in Wittenberg that it is the foundation of our worship, our church, our lives and our hope. We must then, dear saints, continue to study and learn the difference between law and Gospel. When we read the Scriptures we ask, "Is this passage law or Gospel? Is it telling me what to do (or what I have not done), or is the text telling me what Jesus has done for my salvation?"

We should be asking the same question when we listen to sermons and Bible lessons: "Is this law or is this Gospel?" And even more, as we listen to our daily conversations, "Am I being told the law or the Gospel?" When we ask this question we find that most of our days are filled with law, instruction, demands, criticisms, etc., and that each of us lives is a barren wilderness in which the Gospel is rarely heard, even among Christians! That which we need to hear the most is that which is least spoken: that Christ Jesus has died for us, has forgiven us, and because of Him we are the beloved of God the Father. This promise of forgiveness for the sake of Jesus is what gives us life, salvation, forgiveness and freedom.

This distinction between the law and the Gospel is the foundation of all that we believe, teach and confess as these excerpts from the Lutheran documents below emphatically express.

This difference between the Law and the Gospel is the height of knowledge in Christendom. Every person and all persons who assume or glory in the name of Christian should know and be able to state this difference. If this ability is lacking, one cannot tell a Christian from a heathen or a Jew; of such supreme importance is this differentiation. This is why St. Paul so strongly insists on a clean-cut and proper differentiating of these two doctrines.

[Martin Luther, Sermon On Galatians, 1532]

As the distinction between the Law and the Gospel is a special brilliant light, which serves to the end that God's Word may be rightly divided, and the Scriptures of the holy prophets and apostles may be properly explained and understood, we must guard it with especial care, in order that these two doctrines may not be mingled with one another, or a law be made out of the Gospel, whereby the merit of Christ is obscured and troubled consciences are robbed of their comfort, which they otherwise have in the holy Gospel when it is preached genuinely and in its purity, and by which they can support themselves in their most grievous trials against the terrors of the Law.

I hope that the next time you are asked what Lutherans believe, you speak of the Lord's Law and the Gospel, and that you speak of these two teachings even when you're not asked! And even more, that in our own lives we are always sorting out

words of law and Gospel, and we continue to hold and cling to the life giving words of the forgiveness of sins which we hear in the holy and precious Gospel. Amen.

### A CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE FOR AN ELECTION YEAR

The year 2022 is crucial for America. Even those who only casually follow politics can identify the high stakes and differing visions that exist for the future of our nation. But what should be the actions and approaches of believers in Jesus Christ during this election season and beyond? After all, aren't we all concerned that God's will be done? I would like us to consider an idea that may get lost in the noise of election-year ads, polls, debates and sound bites.

Certainly, prayer should be an indispensable activity for Christians at such a time as this. Isn't it important to wrestle with the content of our prayers for America to ensure they are Biblical? Are they motivated by the heart of God and His priorities? We do not want the prayer lives of followers of Christ in America to fall in the category of either failing to pray or praying with misguided motives.

Two New Testament prayers give us solid direction not only for what we should pray, but also what to do as a result of the prayer. The first prayer came as a result of local leaders in Jerusalem prohibiting Peter and John from preaching the gospel of Christ. When word reached the church, they responded with a remarkable request in **Acts 4:24b-30** 

"Lord, You are God, Who made heaven and earth and the sea, and all that is in them, Who by the mouth of Your servant David have said: Why did the nations rage, And the people plot vain things? The kings of the earth took their stand, And the rulers were gathered together against the Lord and against His Christ.' For truly against Your holy Servant Jesus, whom You anointed, both Herod and Pontius Pilate, with the Gentiles and the people of Israel, were gathered together to do whatever Your hand and Your purpose determined before to be done. Now, Lord, look on their threats, and grant to Your servants that with all boldness they may speak Your word, by stretching out Your hand to heal, and that signs and wonders may be done through the name of Your holy Servant Jesus."

The ones praying here acknowledge that their leaders and culture are persecuting them, just as they had done

with Jesus. But their request is not for policy change or comfortable treatment. Their priority was the gospel and an open door to be able to keep sharing it. No boycotts, no protests. Just child-like faith that believed God would continue to let them freely proclaim the message they had been called to spread.

The second prayer shows that we don't have to speculate on what Paul's goal was when praying for his government. In 1 Timothy 2:1-4 Paul plainly taught what should be the content of our prayers for leaders: First of all, I urge that entreaties and prayers, petitions and thanksgivings, be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity. This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

This isn't just a call to pray for leaders without specificity. The motivation and results are clear. Pray for the salvation of our leaders. Pray for them to grow in knowing God and His will. How will that happen? It must be part of the Church's mission – we need to go to them, not with placards of protest but with spiritual care. Speak the truth of God's Word into their lives in emails, letters on the phone or if possible with face-to-face town-hall meetings. Pray for their hearts to be opened to the gospel. For believing lawmakers, encourage them in their walk not to compromise God's principles found in Scripture.

Do we know who our leaders are at all levels of government? How can we pray for them if we do not? In a representative republic, it's great that we can be a part of the process by voting and contacting leaders with our opinions, but how often do our words to them communicate our concern for their eternal destination? Prayers for leaders are required of God's people. But they must be underpinned with a motivation to see God glorified, not just save our land for our children. The goal must not be just a change in laws, but in the hearts of lawmakers.

### "We Are All Beggars"

In the early morning hours of Feb. 18, 1546, Martin Luther closed his eyes forever. Before that happened, the hand that hammered the 95 Theses into the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on Oct. 31, 1517, penned its final words: "We are all beggars. This is true." And this is the truth that our Lord says makes you free.

Ironic, isn't it? In order to be free, you must be a beggar. You must be utterly dependent and reliant upon God. This makes us uncomfortable — the way we're uncomfortable when someone gets us a Christmas present when we haven't gotten them one. We feel we owe them. And we don't like being in someone's debt like that.

But what Luther would remind us is that we are all indeed beggars. And we're not just anyone's beggars. We're God's beggars. Christ came for sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He came to heal the sick and raise the dead. He came for sinners, and He dwells only with sinners.

If we are to be where He is, we must be willing to be counted among the lost, the sick, and the dead. We must be willing to be beggars. We must cry out for mercy, for grace, and for his undeserved love and kindness. We must be dependent solely on Him and what He gives.

And here's the beauty: He gives us everything. Everything. Forgiveness of sins, salvation from death and the devil, and eternal life. This isn't because of any worthiness or merit in us. It is because of His divine goodness, mercy, and grace. On account of Christ's

death and resurrection, the Father forgives you, saves you, and is pleased with you. You receive His love, His righteousness, His holiness, His acceptance, and His inheritance. We are all beggars. This is true.

This is the heart and soul of Christianity and the lifeblood of the Christian Church. God justifies us and declares us innocent and righteous by His grace received through faith for the sake of Christ. This isn't because of our works but because of His work on the cross. We, who once were enemies of God, are reconciled to Him and made to be His children.

This is what Luther pointed us to when He took up his pen for the last time and scribbled "We are all beggars. This is true." We are beggars, but we are beggars of the God who does not ignore us and who doesn't pass by us on the other side. We are beggars of the One who descended from heaven to make His dwelling with sinners.

We are beggars of Him who deigns to dwell with us, among us, and – yes – still in us by grace for Christ's sake. For in the bread and cup that we bless we share together with Christ and each other the riches of God's grace. The riches of this grace – the Gospel in sermon and absolution, in Baptism, and in Holy Communion – are so inexhaustible that our cups overflow. We, who are God's beggars, are inexhaustibly satisfied, and we have something to give back in thanksgiving and praise.


