

# THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR

We can only be said to be alive in those moments when our hearts are conscious of our treasures.

~Thornton Wilder

Once again the holiday season has rolled around and people are saying, "Where did the year go?" Already the stores are filled with Christmas decorations. These days Thanksgiving is basically a pre-season holiday, something you do to get in shape for Christmas. We eat, we sleep, we watch football, and we don't stop until January. That's a shame because the art of giving thanks is one thing that separates man from the animals. To receive a gift and say, "Thank you," is one of the humblest and yet honorable things a person can do.

There is nothing small or trivial about it. To say "Thank you" is to acknowledge that we have been given something we did not earn and do not deserve. Happy is the man who understands that all of life is a gift of God and that life itself is the ultimate gift. Which is why the Bible says, "In everything give thanks." (I Thess. 5:18) When we can't do anything else, we can always be grateful. As someone has said, "If you can't be thankful for what you have received, be thankful for what you have escaped."

With that in mind, I'd like to bring a special Thanksgiving message from Psalm 131, one of the "Songs of Ascent." That means it was part of a group of Psalms which were sung as the Hebrew pilgrims made their way up the mountains toward the city of Jerusalem for one of the annual festivals. Fifteen of these Psalms are grouped together—numbers 120-134. Their purpose is to prepare the heart for worship. There are three verses in Psalm 131 and each one

reveals an important quality for us to consider as we approach the Thanksgiving season.

- 1. **Humility** The Psalm begins, using the Contemporary English Version (CEV) with these words, "I am not conceited, Lord, and I don't waste my time on impossible schemes." Not many of us would begin a prayer this way. But to be honest, it's always tricky to talk about humility. How do you know when you're truly humble? Come to think of it, if you are truly humble, will you even know it? It has been well said that humility is the virtue which, when you think you have it, you've lost it. So let's be very honest with ourselves on this point - There are no merit badges for humility. We live in a culture that puts a very low value on humility. From the moment we enter the world we are urged to get ahead, to climb the ladder, to look out for number one, to win through intimidation, and to prove our success by the car we drive, by the home we buy, by the clothes we wear, and by the friends we keep. We all feel the pinch. Not long ago a friend told me that he hates Christmas because giving gifts has become a game where your love is measured by how much you spend. It's a sad commentary on the way we live.
- 2. Simplicity Verse 2 brings before us a second quality that is very useful as we approach Thanksgiving. It is the quality of simplicity. "But I have learned to feel safe and satisfied, just like a young child on its mother's lap." The picture is one only a mother can fully understand. Yet here is the truth: Unless a mother weans her

child, the child will never grow up. To be weaned is to have something removed from your life which you thought you couldn't live without. David is saying, "I've come to the place where the things I thought I had to have, I don't need anymore. Now my soul is quiet and content." Is that how you feel? If not, then no wonder Thanksgiving just whizzes on by. No wonder Christmas is a nightmare. No wonder we are never satisfied. Instead of being weaned from the world, we are wedded to it. Or maybe I should say, welded to it. In any case, our soul is anything but quiet, our outlook anything but peaceful.

3. Integrity - There is a third principle to be added to humility and simplicity. It is the principle of integrity. Verse 3 says, "People of Israel, you must trust the Lord now and forever." The word "trust" in Hebrew means first to wait, then to wait expectantly. The concept is very close to our English word "confidence." An expanded definition would be "to wait on something because you know the thing you are waiting for will happen because the person you are waiting on is trustworthy."

David is saying, "You have a choice to make. Either you choose to live like everyone else or you choose to wait on the Lord." Once a child is weaned, the apron strings have been cut. The child comes to rest on his mother's lap not because he wants something but because he wants to be near his mother. In the same way, God weans us from our dependence on the things of this world so that we will not be bribed into trusting him. What credit is it if you trust God because you have a spouse, a house, a job, a happy home, a secure future, and good health? What will you do when you lose your spouse, your job, your home, your family, your security, your reputation, and your health? When life tumbles in, what then? That's what integrity is all about. It's choosing to put your confidence in God alone. It's believing that he has answers to questions you can barely understand. It's coming to the place where you don't measure your spirituality by your prosperity. It's finding rest in your soul because you discover that the things you used to crave aren't so important anymore.

It was Jesus who said, "Unless you change and become like little children, you will never

enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 18:3) What was he talking about? Was it not a faith that is childlike in its simplicity? I think that is exactly what Jesus was talking about when He said, "Unless you become like a little child." It is faith which is childlike in its simplicity. There is something our children can teach us at Thanksgiving. They can teach us what it means to have a simple and uncomplicated trust in God.

How does God go about weaning us from our dependence on the things of the world? I ran across a three-part answer from a Bible commentator writing over a century ago.

**First,** he makes the things of the world bitter to us.

**Second,** he removes one by one the things on which we depend.

**Third,** he gives us something better.

In the end, we find that we no longer need the things we used to think we couldn't do without. And our walk with God is stronger than ever before. To illustrate this truth I would like to share this prayer folded in the pocket of dead Confederate soldier who was found at the end of a bloody battle during the Civil War:

- I asked God for strength, that I might achieve; I was made weak, that I might learn humbly to obey.
- I asked for health, that I might do greater things; I was given infirmity, then I might do better things.
- I asked for riches, that I might be happy; I was given poverty, that I might be wise.
- I asked for power, that I might have the praise of men; I was given weakness, that I might feel the need of God.
- I asked for all things, that I might enjoy life; I was given life, that I might enjoy all things.
- I got nothing I asked for, but everything I had hoped for.
- Almost despite myself, my unspoken prayers were answered.
- I am, among men, most richly blessed.

It is a great advance in spiritual understanding to be able to say, "I got nothing I asked for, but everything I had hoped for." That's what simplicity, humility, and integrity are all about.

# ONE VOICE FOR PUBLIC POLICY

#### The Coming Election: What's at Stake?

Friends in Christ,

With less than four weeks until the election, we can all anticipate a steady diet of political ads trying to draw our attention toward some issues and away from others, depending, of



course, on what politicians judge to be most advantageous to their cause. Given that dynamic, I'd like to offer brief reflections on a few specific issues Christian voters should pay special attention to as they prepare to cast their vote. The Church, of course, has no particular expertise, and takes no stand, on a majority of issues that are dealt with in the political sphere. But, it does speak to some, including those dealing with life issues (abortion and physician assisted suicide), marriage/family, religious liberty, and parental rights. The Church speaks to these issues because Scripture speaks to them in clear and unambiguous ways.

As it stands now, the following are some of those specific issues that will be directly impacted by the outcome of November's election.

#### On the federal level:

**1.** Concerning the Redefinition of Marriage – Though, sadly, the Courts have previously redefined marriage to include same-sex couples and are now actively contemplating the legalization of polyamory (marriages of more than two persons), these changes have not all been incorporated into federal statute, that is, through legislative action. Depending on the outcome of November's election, the effort to embed these unbiblical changes into federal law will either be squelched or propelled forward (largely through the deceptively named "Respect for Marriage Act"). Therefore, I urge you to know where the candidates stand on this specific piece of legislation and to withhold support from those who would advocate for it, especially those candidates running for the U. S. House of Representatives.

#### On the State level:

**2.** There is currently an effort to radically change the Minnesota State Standards that govern teacher licensure. If these proposed changes are finalized in their current form, every teacher wishing to be licensed by the State will be pressured to incorporate various disturbing concepts in their teaching. These concepts fall under the general heading of Critical Race Theory ... though that specific terminology may not be used in these standards. These various elements are not appropriate for K-12 classrooms as they are clearly

forms of political indoctrination and, in some cases, reflect anti-Christian doctrines. If you are unfamiliar with these proposed changes, I would direct you to the 2022 Lutheran Voter Information Guide recently released by our District's Public Policy Committee. It can be accessed on the District website or on the website of the Minnesota Child Protection League (https://cplaction.com). Again, I would encourage you to inform yourself of where candidates stand on this issue.

- **3.** One of the more disturbing trends of recent years has been the tendency of the State to regard itself as the primary authority in the life of children rather than their parents. This tendency surfaces most frequently in K-12 educational settings. More specifically, the State frequently asserts it has the right to a) dissuade parents from choosing a religiously grounded education for their children by denying them the same funding offered to parents who choose a non-religious education, b) provide forms of pro-abortion advocacy and access without parental knowledge or consent, and c) provide gender transition counseling to students without parental knowledge or consent. The outcome of this election will be crucial in determining whether these and other encroachments on parental rights will be allowed to continue and perhaps intensify.
- **4.** With the recent Dobbs ruling by the U. S. Supreme Court, the issue of abortion has now been largely returned to the states. Unfortunately, in Minnesota this has not meant the end of legal abortions. Quite the opposite, Minnesota is now becoming a "mecca" for those seeking abortions from other states where it is now restricted or banned. It is, therefore, more important than ever to elect legislators and a governor that will stand up for the life of the unborn, who like us, are made in the image and likeness of God.

These, of course, are not the only important matters at stake in this coming election. It is my hope and prayer, however, that you will use whatever opportunities God gives you to lift up these particular issues in your congregation, as well as among your friends and acquaintances. It has, of course, become cliché' to say this may be one of the most consequential elections ever. But, in view of the truly radical new views being actively and coercively promoted in recent years, I believe this is, indeed, just such a crucial election. God grant each of us will not only cast our vote in a Godpleasing way, but we might also serve as His instrument to influence others in a way that will bring honor and glory to God and serve the needs of our neighbor.

#### What Makes for a Cheerful Giver?

St. Paul wrote to Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for *God loves a cheerful giver*" (2 Cor. 9:7). God loves a cheerful giver. But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, he gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, he prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall we say? For time would fail us to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave. So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything – yes, even His life – enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty, we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ, give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart for the joy set before us. It's the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

#### **Actions that Build a Friendlier Church**



# STEWARDSHIP 3 YR LECTIONARY

#### November 6 - All Saints' Day (Observed)

Matthew 5:6 – "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied." You only hunger and thirst for what you don't have. Jesus has come to fill us up with righteousness – His own righteousness. He is the self-giving Lord whose sacrifice inspires us to be givers, too.

#### November 13 - Proper 28

Luke 21:6 – "As for these things that you see, the days will come when there will not be left here one stone upon another that will not be thrown down." Everything in this world is headed for the graveyard, but some things are also destined to rise from the grave. On that Day of Resurrection – as we look back on our earthly life – what will we see? What will have really mattered? This is a good question to ask ourselves in this season of the church year that focuses on The Last Things.

#### November 20 - Proper 29

Colossians 1:18a – "And he is the head of the body, the church." We are part of the Body of Christ; He is our Head. Where He goes, we follow. His thoughts direct our actions. This is how the people of God learn how to give and why they give. Because Jesus gives, indeed He gives all He has.

#### November 24 - Thanksgiving Day

Deuteronomy 8:7 – "For the LORD your God is bringing you into a good land ..." Have we received any less than the sons of Israel in this great and glorious land? We are so very blessed! Let us then outdo even the sons of Israel in giving thanks!

#### November 27 - Advent I

Could they really be used by the Lord for some great, heavenly purpose? This is one facet of stewardship we often forget. The blessing it is to us to be of service in the Lord's Kingdom. # THE SEASON OF ADVENT



Advent marks the beginning of the new Christian year. In 2022, Advent begins November 27. Despite the "high festoonery" our

materialistic culture begins to pile on right after Thanksgiving, if not sooner, Advent is not a season for pomp or decoration, but for simplicity. Advent historically has been to Christmastide what Lent is to Eastertide: a season of solemnity and simplicity, and even a season of penitence, the reason why the color for the Advent season used to be purple. Although Advent is now less frequently penitential, it is no less solemn. The impact of the miraculous event of the incarnation continues -- and the light of hope that appeared in the darkness of that night in Bethlehem two thousand years ago still shines on us today, even in the midst of life's most difficult situations. This year the powerful messages celebrate the heartwarming joy of Christ's coming, under the theme Angels: The Ultimate Divine Messengers of Hope as they demonstrate how we can rely on the Lord to serve as our steady lighthouse while we navigate the shoals of life.
