

ARE YOU A MEMBER OR...

A great many people tend to equate membership in the church with Christianity. It is true the New Testament uses the word "member", but in a very special way. To get to the heart of this misconception we need to understand that the New Testament speaks of a living, vital membership in the body of Christ, not just an external, nominal membership in some institution, organization, or congregation.

"For as in one body we have many members, and all the members do not have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ and individually members one of another." Romans 12: 4-5

In other words, The New Testament uses the word "member" to describe a "functioning person. All parts of the body work together productively to achieve the purposes of Christ, the Head. In view of the meaningless -ness to which the term membership has degenerated in church life, perhaps it is high time that we speak of "discipleship" The Church will become strong and influential if its members become Christian disciples.

Disciple is a word applied frequently to Christians in Scriptures. Jesus said to those who believed in Him: "If you continue in My Word, then you are My disciples indeed; and you shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free."

A church "member" may avoid too much exposure to the Word lest he or she get too involved, but a "disciple" will be very much involved in studying and applying the Word to their daily lives. We need many more church-related persons moving from the passive role of occasional auditors of the Word to the active role of regular students of the Word. Jesus said, "Who ever of you who do not forsake all that you have, cannot be My disciple." In the same discourse Jesus said, "If any one comes to Me and does not hate his father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, their own life also, He or she cannot be My disciple." Again Jesus used the word disciple. A disciple is a selfless follower of the Master. They are willing to put themselves out for.... to support.... and to defend the One they follow.

What a contrast between this description of a person who follows Christ in the committed and dedicated way that Jesus describes as a "disciple" and the average church "member" who caters to their own comfort, desires, whims. The church cannot hope to do its job in the world today with the easygoing, half-hearted, lukewarm, offhand, part-time sort of participation typical of most church members. We need more devoted disciples, determined to be nothing less than imitators of Christ, "who humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even death on the cross." Philippians 2:8

"The disciple is not above His Master", said Jesus. We are called by the Holy Spirit to remember that Jesus Himself was not above washing His disciples' feet. He also said, "In this My Father is glorified, that you bear much fruit, so shall you be My disciples."

Church membership may just be hanging around or visiting the vineyard once in a while, but a disciple is productive, he or she bears much fruit.


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The evidence that Jesus gives that "By this shall all men know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another." Church members may bicker and belittle one another; but Jesus' disciples are known for their great love for one another. This cannot happen if we are not in fellowship with one another, understanding each others' issues we are facing or joys we are experiencing.

Even our Lord's great commission was not to make people "members" of congregations but to "make disciples of all nations" If church membership has become dull and unexciting for you, try being a disciple. Ask God to help you burst out of the old patterns, for His heart's desire is for you to become His disciple. Learn to serve the Lord in the joy of discipleship as we move from this Lenten journey to the joyous Easter season.




BIBLE BOOKENDERS




It is alive!

A Better Way

The most common question about stewardship is not whether a Christian should give to their church. Of course Christians should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Rather, the ques-tion asked most is, "How much should I give?" But this question really means, "Should Chris-tians give a tenth of their income to their local congregation?"

Here are some common reasons against tithing. Some say tithing isn't necessary because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. There is no "Thus saith the Lord," or "should" concerning tithing. Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these together with treasures (money) add up to more than a tithe. Still others say that they give of their treasures to other things be-sides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church. And then there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of some fear. They are afraid that if they tithe, their gift will be misused, or that after tithing, there won't be enough left over to get the things that they use, want or need.

Here are some reasons why Christians should tithe. Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to. And on top of this, St. Paul often describes giving a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of one's income — terms similar to a tithe (2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? This tithe was intended to support the ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry. What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther used in the Small Cate-chism's Table of Duties to explain what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? After all, there is no

passage in the New Testa-ment that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest verse we have, and it states simply that Christians should not neglect gathering together. And even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments.

So, what would you say to that son or daughter? The conversation might go something like this. I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of for-giveness, life and salvation, and to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament. But you can do bet-ter, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it.

We should approach the topic of tithing with a similar conversation. The tithe is not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, we're ecstatic that you're giving, and that you're giving in all these various ways — time, talents and treasures. But there is a better way. And that will only be a blessing to you, just as the Word of God — Old and New Testament alike — promises. Can you try increasing your gifts over the coming weeks, months and years? Can you put your trust in the God who sent His Son to take away your sin and give you everlasting life? And if He did this for you, if He did not spare His only Son, how will He not give you all things? He will not disap-point.
