

# FROM THE PASTOR

#### You Were Born to be You!

Who am I? Why am I here? Do I have a purpose? What was I created to be and to do? Does God have a plan for my life?

These are all questions we struggle with from time to time — questions some struggle with all the time. How about you? Ever wonder why you were placed on this earth? Does another year passing make you sad because it means you still do not know why you were born? Recently I was reading an older English version of the New Testament translated by J. B Phillips and found the easy English prose rather insightful. So maybe the apostle Paul can offer us some help:

<sup>3-8</sup> As your spiritual teacher I give this piece of advice to each one of you. Don't cherish exaggerated ideas of yourself or your importance, but try to have a sane estimate of your capabilities by the light of the faith that God has given to you all. For just as you have many members in one physical body and those members differ in their functions, so we, though many in number, compose one body in Christ and are all members of one another. Through the grace of God we have different gifts. If our gift is preaching, let us preach to the limit of our vision. If it is serving others let us concentrate on our service; if it is teaching let us give all we have to our teaching; and if our gift be the stimulating of the faith of others let us set ourselves to it. Let the man who is called to give, give freely; let the man who wields authority think of his responsibility; and let the man who feels sympathy for his fellows act cheerfully. (Romans 12:3-8 J.B. Phillips)

What I found refreshing about the way he translates is that he makes it easy to summarize the insightful issues that

can make us take our eyes off the goal that Christ has set for us.

Insight Number One: Maybe we think too much about ourselves.

In verse 3, Paul says: "Don't cherish exaggerated ideas of yourself or your importance..." Maybe one way to read that would be, "Don't spend so much time thinking about yourself." Use sober or clear-headed judgment about yourself. Maybe we spend too much time trying to figure ourselves out when we should spend more time focusing on God and what He is doing, and how we are to fit into His plan.

Insight Number Two: God's plan for us is not necessarily a puzzle to be solved.

It is mysterious but the puzzle has been solved. Here is St. Paul's summary of how he saw His commission in the kingdom of God:

<sup>24-26</sup>I myself have been made a minister of this same Gospel, and though it is true at this moment that I am suffering on behalf of you who have heard the Gospel, yet I am far from sorry about it. Indeed, I am glad, because it gives me a chance to complete in my own sufferings something of the untold pains for which Christ suffers on behalf of His body, the Church. For I am a minister of the Church by divine commission, a commission granted to me for your benefit and for a special purpose: that I might fully declare God's word—that sacred mystery which up to now has been hidden in every age and every generation. (Colossians 1:25-26 J. B Phillips)

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Did you hear where Paul's focus was? It wasn't on himself. Look again at where Paul found plan for His ministry: "For I am a minister of the Church by divine commission, a commission granted to me for your benefit and for a special purpose..." That is a major part of the reason you are here, "to allow Christ to be revealed in you as a benefit for others". That happens when you have made your life a living sacrifice as Paul says in Romans 12:1-2, "Do not let the world around you squeeze you into its own mold, but let God re-mold your minds from within, so that you may prove in practice that the plan of God for you is good, meets all His demands and moves you towards the goal of true maturity."

#### Insight Number Three: You were born to be you.

God makes it clear that we are all different, but we are all joined in Christ's Body to be one. We all have different gifts, but we make up the one body. We cannot be someone else. We do not have their gift. Although we may have similar qualities as our parents, as our siblings, as our closest friends, we are not them. We were not created to be them or to be like them. We were formed in our mother's womb to be us. We are to be part of the Body of Christ as designed by God, and as He designed us. **You were born to be you.** That is where you can be your best. That is where you will flourish. So, be who you were born to be: be you to the glory of Christ!

# **Stewardship in the First Commandment**

The greatest gift that Martin Luther gave to us was his Small Catechism. The word "enchiridion" is part of the original title of this work. This is the Greek word for "handbook." The Small Cate-chism is a handbook of the Bible. All the basic knowledge that a Christian needs to understand the faith and live a godly life has been taken from the Bible and distilled into this beautiful little book of Christian piety.

Luther starts with the Ten Commandments.

The First Commandment: You shall have no other gods. What does this mean? We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things. (SC I)

We have a God above us. He is the Lord God and we are not. He is Almighty and in control. He is righteous and good. And therefore, we should fear Him.

This God is also our heavenly Father. He wants us to be saved. He does not want us to suffer His just wrath. He has provided salvation for us in His Son, Jesus Christ. And therefore, we should love Him.

Our heavenly Father will never leave us nor forsake us. He has promised as much — and the Bi-ble shows us that He always keeps His promises. So, we should trust Him.

In the Large Catechism, Luther explains how money and possessions form one of the greatest temptations against the First Commandment:

This I must unfold somewhat more plainly, that it may be understood and perceived by ordinary examples of the contrary. Many a one thinks that he has God and everything in abundance when he has money and possessions: he trusts in them and boasts of them with such firmness and assurance as to care for no one. Lo. such a man also has a god, Mammon by name, i.e., money and possessions, on which he sets all his heart, and which is also the most common idol on earth. He who has money and possessions feels secure, and is joyful and undismayed as though he were sitting in the midst of Paradise. On the other hand, he who has none doubts and is despondent, as though he knew of no God. For very few are to be found who are of good cheer, and who neither mourn nor complain if they have not Mammon. This [care and desire for money] sticks and clings to our nature, even to the grave. (LC I 5–9)

These words of Dr. Luther should call us to repentance; sometimes, we live and act like we don't have a Father in heaven. We seek our comfort and peace outside of His gracious promises. But we do have a Father in heaven. He does love us. All His promises are true. And the Lord will surely provide. If that is our belief, then our outward lives will reflect our belief in our acts of generosity and mercy. We will see money and possessions not as gods but rather as tools for do-ing God's work.

reform echoed throughout the world and in the lives of ordinary people.



# ADULT BIBLE STUDY

# SPIRITUAL GROWTH

### Who's in Charge of Your Spiritual Growth?

Not enough is said about finishing well. Yet God considers it a virtue of sticking with something until it's done... of hanging tough when excitement and fun



fade into discipline and determination. We've become a people who embrace the "let's-just-quit" mentality. Dieting requires discipline, so we stay fat. Working through conflict is wearying, so we divorce. Sticking with an occupation is tough, so we resign. It's no different with spiritual matters. So many Christians start like lightning—hot, fast, and dazzling. But how many continue the course with sustained enthusiasm and vigor? Oh, some do, but why so few?

Our problem isn't that we're ignorant of God's expectations. His standard stretches from Genesis to Revelation. I could many verses to show this but I believe St. Paul expresses this so well in Romans:

# SEPTEMBER COMMEMORATIONS

You may have noticed in on pages x-xi in the front of our Lutheran Service Book a list of Commemorations commonly observed in the Lutheran Church. There are also listed historic commemorations of some of our forbearers in the faith on pages xii and xiii. The following brief descriptions of the significance of these commemorations in September are from the Treasury of Daily Prayer.

#### **Holy Cross Day (September 14)**

One of the earliest annual celebrations of the Church. The cross on which our Lord was crucified has become the universal symbol for Christianity, replacing the fish



symbol of the early church, though the latter has been revived in recent times. After the end of the persecution era, early in the fourth century, pilgrims began to travel to Jerusalem to visit and pray at the places associated with the life of Jesus. Helena, the mother of the emperor, was a Christian and, while overseeing excavations in the city, is said to have uncovered a cross, which many believed to be the Cross of Christ. Holy Cross Day, traditionally commemorated this discovery of the original cross of Jesus on September 14, 320, in Jerusalem. Later a basilica was built on the site of the Holy Sepulchre, so in conjunction with the dedication of a basilica at the site of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection, the festival day was made official by order of Constantine in AD 335. Holy Cross Day has remained popular in both Eastern and Western Christianity. Many Lutheran parishes have chosen to use "Holy Cross" as the name of their congregation.

#### St. Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist (September 21)

St. Matthew, also known as Levi, identifies himself as a former tax collector, one who was therefore considered unclean, a public sinner, outcast from the Jews. Yet it was such a one as this whom the Lord Jesus called away from his occupation and wealth to become a disciple (Matthew 9:9-13). Not



only did Matthew become a disciple of Jesus, he was also called and sent as one of the Lord's twelve apostles (Matthew 10:2-4). In time, he became the evangelist whose inspired record of the Gospel was granted first place in the ordering of the New Testament. Among the four Gospels, Matthew's portrays Christ especially as the new and greater Moses, who graciously fulfills the Law and the Prophets (Matthew 5:17) and establishes a new covenant of salvation in and with His own blood (Matthew 26:27-28). His symbol is three blue money bags on a white shield.



Matthew's Gospel is also well-known and beloved for its record of the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12); for the Sermon on the Mount, including the Beatitudes and the Our Father (Matthew 5-7); and for the institution of Holy Baptism and the most explicit revelation of the Holy Trinity (Matthew 28:16-20). Tradition is uncertain where his final field of labor was and whether Matthew died naturally or a martyr's death. In celebrating this festival, we therefore give thanks to God that He has mightily governed and protected His Holy Church through this man who was called and sent by Christ to serve the sheep of His pastures with the Holy Gospel. The Winged Man (left) represents St Matthew because his Gospel lays stress on the Incarnation of the Son of God.

#### St. Michael and All Angels (September 29)

The name of the archangel St. Michael means "Who is like God?" Michael is mentioned in the Book of Daniel (12:1), as well as in Jude (v. 9) and Revelation (12:7). Daniel portrays Michael as the angelic helper of Israel who leads the battle against the forces of evil. In Revelation, Michael and his angels fight against and defeat Satan and the evil angels, driving them from heaven. Their victory is made possible by Christ's own victory over Satan in His death and resurrection, a victory

announced by the voice in heaven: "Now the salvation and the power and the kingdom of our God and the authority of His Christ have come" (Revelation 12:10). Michael is often associated with Gabriel and Raphael, the other chief angels or archangels who surround the throne of God. Tradition names Michael as the patron and protector of the Church.
