LENTEN REFLECTIONS

This year the season of Lent begins on February 14th, Ash Wednesday which marks the beginning of the forty days of *Lenten* reflection as we prepare for the celebration of Easter. One source defines the season of Lent in this way: "Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word Leneten, which means 'spring.' Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time for penance by all Christians. The First Sunday describes Jesus' temptation by Satan, and the Sixth Sunday (Passion/Palm Sunday), Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem and His subsequent passion and death. Because Sundays are always little Easters, the penitential spirit of Lent should be tempered with joyful expectation of the Resurrection."

While Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the preparation for Easter, it is the observance immediately prior to Ash Wednesday that is better known, observed and celebrated. Fat Tuesday is a day typically characterized by indulgence. While many think of Mardi Gras as a penultimate celebration, much of the consumption that is associated with Fat Tuesday actually developed as a necessity to avoid waste. Because many people did not consume sweetened breads or other pastries, desserts, and/or other items prepared with dairy products during the season of Lent, these items would

have to be eaten prior to the beginning of the Lenten season because they could not be preserved for the duration of Lent. (Remember, this tradition developed before the days when food could be stored using refrigeration.) "Mardi Gras" is actually the French word for "Fat Tuesday" and the celebrations, often called carnivals, actually refer to the fact that many refrain from eating meat during Lent. (The word "carnival" is derived from the Latin words "carne vale" which means "farewell, meat." Somewhat related to our summer carnival's where the livestock, after they were shown would end up being shipped to the markets.

For most, it is irrelevant whether you intend to participate in Mardi Gras celebrations or whether you intend to refrain from eating meat, desserts, foods prepared with dairy products, or anything else, but what is relevant is how you approach and understand the season of Lent.

Lent is a time for evangelism and for true conversion—a time for growing through repentance, fellowship, prayer, fasting, and concentration upon our baptismal covenant.

We are to be signs of God's kingdom in this world. Lent is thus not giving up something but rather taking upon ourselves the intention and the receptivity to God's grace so that we may worthily participate in the mystery of God

-with-us. Whatever you choose to do or choose to refrain from doing, we should seek to glorify God and live in ways that allow others to feel the love of Christ. From our Baptismal Covenant that we recite each time someone affirms the vows of membership, we say "with God's help we will proclaim the good news and live according to the example of Christ." Penitence, which characterized the observance of Lent, means regret for sin and we should remember that no sin is beyond forgiveness if it is followed by true penitence. Another word for penitence is contrition. One of the hymns of the church declares in the second stanza.

Let me at Thy throne of mercy find a sweet relief, Kneeling there in deep contrition; help my unbelief.

I share this because Ash Wednesday emphasizes a dual encounter: we confront our own mortality and confess our sin before God within the community of faith. The form and content of the service focus on the dual themes of sin and death in light of God's redeeming love in Jesus Christ. It is also recommended that the visual environment for the worship service be solemn and stark. Purple is the most traditional color used throughout Lent; but on Ash Wednesday gray and other dark earth colors, as well as coarse textures are suggested. Will you come to the altar on Ash Wednesday to worship God and begin an intentional time of reflection to ponder the question 'what more can I do to glorify God in my life?' God is waiting and God is calling. Are you listening? Are you responding?

2024 LENTEN SERIES

Ash Wednesday is already on February 14th this year! So I want to inform you of what is coming. Part of this reasoning is that the words of the prophet, Amos, come to us only five times in the three-year lectionary and will be used only twice in this year's Lectionary (B) series, July 14th, and October 13th, so his writings maybe unfamiliar to you. The other part is that I



encourage you to read this short Minor prophet's book.

Sometime around the year 762 BC, Amos, a herdsman from the small Judean town of Tekoa, heard the voice of God and compared it to hearing the roaring of a lion, a roaring that causes pastures to mourn and forests to wither (Amos 1:2). That is some kind of roar! The prophet then personally encounters the Lord as a Lion (3:12), and this propels him to confront Israel's movers and shakers who were deaf to God's call of justice and righteousness (e.g., 5:24; 7:1–17).

This Lent, we will listen to the Lion as He rumbles. And gathering under the cross, we will all the more be amazed when the roaring Lion defeats He greatest enemies: the devil, hell, and the power of death. Then with resurrection joy we will say of Jesus, "The Lion of the tribe of Judah . . . has conquered" (Revelation 5:5).



Caring for My Neighbor

If any of the Ten Commandments might tempt us to think that keeping the Law is easy, it would be the Fifth Commandment. After all, how hard is it to get through life without murdering somebody? The vast majority of people can handle that!

But Jesus famously blows up this notion by pointing out that the command, "you shall not murder," goes much deeper — down to the heart.

You have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, "You fool!" will be liable to the hell of fire. (Matt. 5:21–22)

Hatred and disdain come from the same sort of crookedness of heart as murder. With both murder and hatred, you look down on another person and think them of little worth.

In the Small Catechism, Luther also points out that every "do not" in the commandments also includes a "do this:"
"We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or

harm our neighbor in his body but help and support him in every physical need" (SC, Fifth Commandment, emphasis added).

We are not called merely to avoid evil; we must also do positive good.

So when Jesus drew near to us and became our neighbor by taking up our humanity, He came not only to avoid harming us, but He came to positively help us, bless us and serve us.

We are now called to show the love to our neighbors that Christ showed to us. Your neighbor is yet another gift that God has given you that requires your stewardship. We are called to show mercy, to be kind, to love and serve our neighbor. One aspect of this stewardship is financial: our neighbors need us to support the church's work so that they can hear the Gospel and come to faith. Our neighbors need the church's alms and mercy work. Our neighbors need our faithful service in all we do in the name of Christ.



FAST FACTS ABOUT LENT



- ⇒ Lent is a 40 day Christian festival beginning Ash Wednesday and concluding on Easter (Sundays are not counted) What we now call Lent was originally a period of fasting and study for catechumens who were to be baptized on the Saturday before Easter. The 40 day fast was said by Athanasius in 339 AD to be celebrated the world over. The 40 day fast of Jesus in the wilderness was responsible for the number 40 being chosen.
- ⇒ The word "Lent" comes from the old Anglo-Saxon word lengten, which means "springtime," named so for the time of the year in which it occurs. As someone has said: "Lent is the Church's springtime. Out of the darkness of sin's winter emerges a people the Church--reborn through baptism into their Lord's death and resurrection from the grave."
- ⇒ The purpose of this extended fast was to practice selfdenial and humility. This was to prepare oneself for receiving God's grace and forgiveness in baptism, given on Easter Saturday.
- ⇒ The liturgical color for Lent is purple, the color of repentance and sorrow for sin.
- ⇒ Lent prepares us for the observance of Jesus Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection for us. It is a season of repentance and sorrow for sin. Lent is a time of self -examination in light of the Ten Commandments; it is a time of giving up of sinful behavior, a time of personal housecleaning. It is a time of commitment to the new life of Christ begun in baptism. It is a time of disciplined study of Scripture and a time of growing

in faith. In recent years Lent has become a time to remember our baptisms. It is a time to reflect on the impact of baptism on our lives, and to ask ourselves how we are doing. Most of all, it is a time of renewal and new beginnings, as we through faith apply the complete forgiveness won by Christ's death to our lives. Lent heightens our awareness that we desperately need Jesus Christ.

- ⇒ Lent is an opportunity not an obligation. It is not commanded by our Lord, nor is it even mentioned in the Bible. Those Christians who observe it do so because they find it a helpful opportunity for repentance and renewal, for the strengthening of their faith. Christians are free to observe or not observe Lent.
- ⇒ Ashes are applied to the forehead of Christians in the sign of the cross (throughout the Middle Ages ashes were sprinkled on the head) as a symbol of humility and repentance. The ashes are a reminder that we are "dust and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19). Thus, they are a reminder of our mortality cursed as it is by sin. Moreover, the ashes remind us of our limits, of what we are, and how greatly we need God's mercy in Christ.
- ⇒ Let it be new, in that instead of "giving up" something, we should do something positive and practical and helpful for someone else. One Church suggests that during the first week parishioners express love for someone; in the second week, to write a letter of appreciation; in the third, to make a special phone call. In the fourth they are asked to send flowers, a book, or baked goods to someone new; in the fifth, pray for someone by name; and in the final week attend worship with someone outside their usual range of friendships.

Let's try it! We might enjoy it! Doing these things for other people is an expression of practical Christianity. Don't worry about being called a "dogooder". The alternatives of being a "do-badder", or doing nothing, are worse. We still remember the deep spiritual disciplines of discipleship, always aware of the self-denial and suffering of our blessed Lord Jesus. We shall be serious, but not sad;.... reverent, but not ultra-pious;.... solemn, but not depressed.


